

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



Dear Residents,

On behalf of the Mansfield Division of Police I would like to extend our gratitude and appreciation to the citizens of Mansfield for their loyal support. As a department, we continue to support our community youth programs such as P.A.L., D.A.R.E. and Safety Town. We have made a commitment to maintain and support our ten regional Neighborhood Watch groups with over 1,000 registered members as well.

The Mansfield Division of Police prides itself on our core values which include Integrity, Honesty, Respect, Professionalism, and Self-Discipline. Our officers receive annual training and certifications throughout the year to ensure that we are providing the best service and protection to our citizens. During 2014 the division handled 20 personnel complaints and also received 81 compliments from citizens who received extraordinary service from our officers, which is nearly a 3% increase.

During 2014 the Division was able to hire twelve new officers. This left the Division with a total of 78 sworn officers by the end of the year. As we look into 2015 we are optimistic that we will be able to bolster the number of our sworn officers within the Division. The Division of Police will continue to provide exceptional service to our citizens with a commitment to our core values.

OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEF



The Office of the Assistant Chief consists of four sections, including: Chaplains, Records, Communications Center and I.T. Services.

RECORDS SECTION

The Records Section was successful at maintaining a less than 1% error rate on all electronic report submissions to the Office of Ohio Criminal Justice Services

(OCJS) for 2013. Records Section staff at the end of the year consisted of the Operations Supervisor, (4) Record Clerks, (1) Transcriber Clerk, and (1) Police Aide. Many positions in the section were eliminated due to budget restraints.

Records Clerks processed 13,080 General Offense reports, 1,279 Traffic Crash reports, and 3,539 Citations. They handled 9,461 phone calls for service, 4,583 window customers, and 1,658 requests for service from Officers on station. In addition, they processed 9,612 warrants, 1,609 pieces of incoming mail, 13,203 scanned documents, and 8,797 Record Checks. In addition to routine daily work, Records Clerks performed and/or processed 28,591 miscellaneous tasks and/or documents. Records also collected \$4,597.45 in revenue from public requests.

Records Section personnel opened, maintained, and stored criminal case jackets, maintained all criminal records and issued City chauffeur's Licenses. In addition, they also performed a variety of other non-specified tasks in support of the Operations Bureau, the Courts, City offices, and other criminal justice agencies from both local and foreign jurisdictions.

The Transcription Unit processed 28 Administrative reports, 114 Confidential reports, 22 Supplemental reports, 766 Victim / Suspect / Witness Statements, 724 Forensic Laboratory reports, and miscellaneous documents.

THE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER (PSCC)

The Public Safety Communications Center (PSCC) mission is to provide efficient support services intra-departmentally, effectively liaison with other City departments and serve the needs of the public by supplying helpful information, re-







ferrals, and facilitating the delivery of emergency and routine police, fire, and EMS services. The PSCC is under the command of Assistant Chief Keith Porch. The current Operations Supervisor is Jerry Botdorf.

CHAPLAIN PROGRAM

The Mansfield Safety Forces Chaplain Corps is entering its twelfth year of ministry since restructuring in 2002. We had one in the corps, Chaplain Mark Dettmer, who serves as Chaplain Coordinator. With the ongoing work of our department we look forward to the growth of our opportunities to serve the personnel and families from the Divisions of Police and Fire, as well as the citizens of the city of Mansfield.

I.T. SERVICES

I.T. Services provides IT Management and Support to the Division (to include the Communications Center), manages the fleet, and is responsible for Division inventory control. This support is provided 24/7 and spans a broad scope inclusive of enterprise level management and planning, continuity of service, password management, and help desk assistance for users. Major projects for 2014 included the implementation of the radar signs within the city.

POLICE AIDE

The Police Aide position is responsible for all in person citizen contacts and all incoming calls for the Administrative staff and Detective Section, while fielding calls for various other departments within the city complex. Duties also include completing Incident Reports that do not require a sworn Officer, completing 314 such reports this year, and processing 373 Felon Registrations, while performing other administrative duties on a daily basis.







COMMUNITY SERVICE BUREAU



The Community Services Bureau is comprised of uniformed patrol, the Traffic Section, and the Detective Section and was commanded by Captain Bret Snavely.

DAY WATCH HIGHLIGHTS

- Day Watch Officers responded to Motel 6 in reference to a shooting. After an investigation, a suspect was arrested for attempted murder, falsification and three warrants. A handgun and over \$1,700.00 dollars were seized.
- Officer Kilgore followed up a lead on a burglary in the county, resulting in the arrest of two subjects for receiving stolen property. Two search warrants were prepared and served at an address on Chilton Avenue and over \$6,200.00 in stolen property, to include a handgun, were recovered.
- Officers responded to a domestic violence on S. Main Street in which the victim was pregnant. The suspect was apprehended
 on Brownwood Road, while attempting to hide from officers. Prior to the suspect's arrest the victim had advised officers that
 the suspect had left the residence with an assault type weap-

on. The weapon was found inside the suspect's belongings at

another residence.

Officer Reed arrested an armed male trying to rob the Credit
Union on S. Diamond Street. The subject was charged with
the aggravated robbery along with having possession of a
stolen firearm which was reported stolen from a vehicle in
2011.



AFTERNOON WATCH HIGHLIGHTS

- Afternoon Watch Officers handled a shooting at a residence on Sycamore Street. One male and one female had gunshot wounds. A gun was recovered and charges were filed.
- Officer Grimshaw handled a theft where the suspect called and attempted to sell the property back to the victim. Galion PD
 apprehended the suspect at the request of Mansfield Division of Police in their jurisdiction. The suspect was turned over to
 Officer Grimshaw with charges of felony theft and an outstanding warrant. The stolen jewelry valued at \$2,765.00 was also
 recovered and returned to the victim.
- Officers responded to an assault with a gun involved. Upon further investigation the subject was located and taken into custody without incident and the victims' stolen phone was recovered. The suspect was charged with aggravated robbery.
- Officers responded to a shot's fired call on W 5th Street. The suspect was located walking several blocks away and a foot chase ensued. The suspect was captured and a semi-automatic pistol was recovered along with heroin and cash.

NIGHT WATCH HIGHLIGHTS

- Officer Hornback assisted OSP on a car stop. K9 Astor alerted to drugs in the vehicle. Two grams of cocaine, ½ gram of marijuana, 20 syringes and approximately \$1000 in stolen property was recovered.
- A Night Watch Officer attempted to stop two suspects that he observed pushing a safe down Junction St. One subject ran but
 was apprehend. Another Officer located a nearby business at 205 Park Avenue East had been broken into.
- Officers handled several theft from vehicles during the shift and the suspect vehicle matched a stolen vehicle out of Richland
 County. Officer Schacherer, who was in an unmarked vehicle, observed the stolen vehicle and officers were able to get it
 stopped. This vehicle was occupied by five people. Upon checking, the majority of the stolen property from the earlier thefts
 was located in the stolen vehicle.
- Officers handled a suicide by cop situation that ended up with the suspect giving up after a lengthy negotiation/standoff. The suspect had fired rounds inside of the residence and fired 4 rounds into the air while officers were present, as well as, holding the gun to his head. The subject was taken into custody without any injury to himself or officers, and transported to the hospital. The suspect was a veteran.

TRAFFIC SECTION

The Traffic Section oversaw a total of eight special events during 2014 including, the Miss Ohio Parade and the Holiday Parade.

The Traffic Section monitors and administers the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP). This initiative involves identifying high crash areas, through analysis; within the city and assigning directed traffic enforcement in hopes of reducing crashes. The Section also utilized the Divisions Speed signs to help promote traffic awareness and education in areas of reoccurring complaints concerning speeders. The Section also was involved in research and development of body cameras and a new MARC's radio system in 2014.

Officers worked 322 STEP details for 1,288 hours of enforcement time during 2014. A total of 1,413 citations were issued and 546 written warnings were issued, which equated to 1.10 citations per hour. The Traffic Section also oversaw and assisted in complex investigations such as, DUI cases involving serious injuries or fatalities.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPACT SECTION

The Neighborhood Impact Section (NIS) is continually evolving and adapting to change. NIS consisted of four officers and volunteers during 2014. The Regional Neighborhood Watch meetings were at a high functioning level and most members have come to truly enjoy being combined with other area groups.

NIS attended 74 Neighborhood Watch meetings and two Neighborhood Watch Leaders' Meetings in 2014. There were six Neighborhood Watch groups that met on a regular basis within the city. There were 1310 registered neighborhood watch members with 11 being added during 2014.

Officers made 161 public appearances which were attended by 4,587 people. These include Neighborhood Watch meetings, Safety Town, tours, Girls Club, Golden Age and various community events. NIS participated in preparing Child ID kits with the assistance of Moose Lodge 2511. An educational table was also set up at these events with various materials related to law enforcement, parenting and safety. NIS also took part in the recruiting efforts for the Police and Fire Test as well as assisting during the physical agility testing for the police test.

NIS mentors youth at the Friendly House through Girls' Club and the after-school program on a weekly basis. NIS participates in knitting, assisting with homework, gymnasium activities, arts and crafts, game room activities and playground activities. NIS assists with monthly senior mentoring through the Golden Age program ran through the Friendly House. NIS also assisted with the DARE Olympics and Safety Town. NIS continued to assist Common Pleas Judge Henson with Drug Court and probation/parole twice a month.

EXPLORERS:

Neighborhood Impact Section continues to participate with the Explorers with the assistance of Advisor Officer Lumadue. There are twelve Explorers, two advisors and one civilian advisor in the unit. NIS attended 127 hours of training throughout the year and one annual banquet and conference MPD Explorer Post 4751 participated in the Ohio Heartland State Competition. They placed first in Search and Arrest, Bomb Threat and Burglary in Progress. Explorers held their annual fundraising event parking cars at the Ohio State Reformatory Haunted Prison Experience. They also participated in many special events and completed over 344 community service hours at parades, emergency drills, safety town, parking details, police memorial services, DARE Olympics, recruiting events and various community events.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER:

The School Resource Officer (SRO) is assigned to Mansfield Senior High during the school year. The SRO handled crimes that occurred during the school day including, possession of drugs, fights, threats, domestic violence incidents, runaways, thefts, and bullying. The S.R.O. position entails informally counselling students and giving formal classroom presentations.







D.A.R.E:

Resistance education is the cornerstone of the Divisions drug education program. D.A.R.E. officers were assigned to the Mansfield City Schools and were the Drug Abuse Resistance Educators. During the school year of 2013 to 2014, D.A.R.E. was taught to 331 elementary and 289 middle school students in four different schools, for a total of 620 graduates. Officers also attended the D.A.R.E. Olympics held in May of 2014. D.A.R.E. officers also participated in summer programs such as "Hooked On Fishing, Not On Drugs" program and assisted in the Safety Town Program.

COPPS:

Mansfield Division of Police sponsors a Citizens on Patrol Program. The program is composed in neighborhoods that have decided to insure the safety of their community by forming a partnership with the Mansfield Division of Police. It is the goal to increase the numbers of volunteers in the upcoming year. The duties include walking foot patrol throughout their own neighborhoods while reporting suspicious activity to the police.

HONOR GUARD/COLOR GUARD:

The Honor Guard and Color Guard represented the Division at Parades, Division Functions, Funerals, and when requested by the Chief of Police. The officers in the unit trained on a regular basis to become fluid and precise in their movements and gain knowledge of special function protocols.

The unit also conducted the Triennial Certification of the Ceremonial Rifles as required by the Department of the Army.







SPECIAL OPERATION BUREAU



The Mansfield Division of Police "Special Operations Bureau" saw many changes in 2014. These changes included a shuffling of Sections between the Division's Bureaus resulting in Organizational Chart realignments. This included the reinstatement of the vacant Captain's position in the "Special Operations Bureau" which was filled in April 2014 by recently promoted Captain, Shari Robertson. The "Special Operations Bureau" was reconfigured to include the Detective Section, Office of Professional Standards/Training Section, the Forensic Science Section, and the newly created full time Crime Analyst position. Captain Robertson was, also, designated as the Division's Accreditation Manager and was responsible for overseeing the Division's re-accreditation effort.

GRANTS

Captain Robertson managed several grants including the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) 2013-2016 Grant, the OCJS Domestic Violence Grant, the PAL Leadership Grant and the Northern Ohio Violent Crime Consortium (NOVCC) grant. She, also, successfully wrote new 2015 grants that were awarded including the 2015 OCJS DV Grant, the 2015 PAL Leadership Grant, and the NOVCC \$35,000 grant. In total, over \$1,000,000 in grants were effectively managed.

ACCREDITATION

The Office of Professional Standards worked on Accreditation proofs and compliance standards. The Division was able to successfully integrate the new PowerDMS software program into the accreditation process which assisted greatly in bringing the Division into compliance with newer CALEA processes and future software implementation. The agency is seeking re-accreditation in April of 2015.

OFFICE OF PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS:

There were five formal In-Service trainings conducted in 2014. Topics included Sovereign Citizen, Criminal Intelligence, Sexual Assault-SANE, Employee Assistance Program, Crime Lab Updates, Accreditation Review, Legal Updates, Annual Field Force, AR-15 Requalification, Cultural Diversity-SAFE-ZONE-Domestic Violence, Professional Car Stops, and Bias Based Profiling. Officers attended Annual Re-certifications on Taser, OC Spray, PR-24, ASP, Response to Resistance, Firearms Safety, Specialty/Chemical munitions, and Blood Borne Pathogens.

Despite vacant positions and budgetary restraints, division personnel received over 3,000 hours of advanced training. This was done by diligently searching for free training opportunities and those with minimal costs. Topics included Crisis Intervention Training, ASP Instructor Course, Taser Instructor Certification, First Line Supervision, Sex Crimes Investigation, FBI's Counterterrorism Awareness Training, School Resource Officer training, Officer Involved Shooting, Flying Armed, Datamaster-Intoxilizer Operator Certification, Field Training Officer Course, Sig Sauer Armorers Course, Glock Armorers Course and Hostage Negotiations.



Additionally, four officers and two dispatchers graduated from CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) for the mentally ill. Several Division officers completed an inhouse Defensive Tactics/Firearms Training class and several non-sworn civilian employees received training in computer software/programs, crime lab techniques, and Divisional In-Service trainings. The Division received an In-Service training on Cultural Diversity and it's attributes which also covered Domestic Violence within the LGBTQ community. SWAT leadership attended the Contemporary Leadership of Police Specialized Units.

FTO/HIRING/RECRUITMENT

Recruitment efforts were enacted and several recruitment opportunities were attended by officers in 2014. The Civil Service Exam was given in June of 2014 with 125 applicants taking the police exam. Of the 125 applicants taking the exam, 78 passed both the written and physical agility test which was certified by the Civil Service Commission in August of 2014. Through the combined efforts of Major Crimes Investigators and the Office of Professional Standards dozens of background investigations were completed on Police Candidates. This led to the Division hiring six new Officers over the 2014 calendar year. Two of the six were certified and immediately began the Field Training Process while the other four will be attending the Ohio State Highway Patrol Academy set to begin in early 2015.

CRIME ANALYST

In April of 2014, the Division hired full time Crime Analyst (C.A.) and assigned her to the "Special Operation Bureau". C.A. immediately began work on providing critical crime data including crime mapping and reports.

DETECTIVE SECTION

The Detective Section falls under the command of the Special Operations Bureau. The Detective Section consisted of two units, the Major Crimes Unit and the Juvenile Crimes Unit in 2014. The Major Crimes Unit consisted of one Lieutenant, one Sergeant, and six Detectives. One of the four Detectives was specialized through a Domestic Violence Grant. This grant was made possible by the Federal Violence Against Women Act. The Juvenile Crimes Unit consisted of two Detectives. One of the two Juvenile Crimes Detectives was assigned to the Richland County Children Services.

In 2014 ,The Detective Bureau investigated 1,819 cases. This is a 9% increase from 2013. The two Major Crimes detectives, investigated 610 cases.

A detective assigned to the Domestic Violence Grant, in conjunction with the Federal Violence Against Women Act was assigned 1,058 cases. The detective arrested 22 defendants for felony charges and 36 defendants for misdemeanor charges. The detective assisted the patrol bureau in 210 domestic violence cases, where misdemeanor charges were filed with the courts, as well as 60 felony arrests. The detective contacted 586 victims of Domestic Violence. The detective attends Domestic Violence Court every other Wednesday throughout the year. The court is run by Judge Jerry Ault, within the Municipal Court System.

The detective assigned to the Richland County Children Services, was assigned 151 cases, which 106 of those cases were referrals from RRCS. Included in those numbers were 126 felonies, 13 misdemeanor's and 12 non-criminal cases. The detective also worked alongside of the Metrich Unit Detective on the newly started Internet Crime Against Children (ICAC) Investigations.

The Detective Bureau assigned 181 Runaways, 31 Missing Persons, and served 13 Search Warrants. There were 47 C.O.D.I.S. cases, and 43 A.F.I.S. cases, reviewed. There were three Homicides within the city in 2014, with offender arrests made in each one.

FORENSIC SCIENCE LABORATORY



Anthony Tambasco Forensic Scientist

The Forensic Science Section is managed by Section supervisor Anthony Tambasco and includes a DNA Analyst and an Evidence Technician. This Section is responsible for maintaining and securing all evidence seized and/or secured by the Division. The Forensic Science Section is accredited by the "American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board" (ASCLD/LAB). In 2014, the Section continued preparing for the transfer from "ASCLD/LAB" Legacy program to the "ASCLD/LAB International" (ISO) accreditation requirements with an external assessment scheduled in January of 2015.

Forensic Science Section Scientist/Director Tambasco administered four grants totaling over \$300,000 this past year including the NIJ "Forensic Backlog of DNA" grant, the "Paul Coverdale Award" grant, and 2 other DNA grants. He, also, successfully oversaw the transition of evidence submission to the "Records Management System/LIMS" protocol. This eliminated the need for a Prop-

erty Control Number and, also, assigned a "Laboratory Information Management Systems" (LIMS) number to evidence needing analysis such as controlled substances, DNA, firearms, etc.

The Forensic Science Section successfully passed its annual Staff Inspection and unannounced Property Audit. Several quality manuals were reviewed and revised in preparation for the transfer to "ASCLD/LAB International" accreditation. Director Tambasco completed a number of presentations to various law enforcement groups as well as citizen groups and neighborhood watches throughout the year.



MOMENTS OF OPPORTUNITY

The Mansfield Police Division implemented the web-based Moments of Opportunity in Police Service in 2011 with the view that each citizen contact is an opportunity to win the respect, trust, and support of the community. The Division recognizes that the community is the first line of defense against crime and the most essential component in preventing it. Positive contacts will reinforce the community's resolve to help us develop safer neighborhoods through community partnerships and participation. A community's willingness to cooperate is born out of the level of trust, respect, and support they have for their police. All police personnel can leverage public support, trust, and respect by embracing and promoting enhanced customer service in policing. In 2014, 81 compliments were received.

Internal Affairs

Complaints are normally assigned by the Office of the Chief to Section Commanders. In the event the complaint may require a more complex or protracted investigation, the commander of the Special Investigative Section is tasked with the responsibility of completing the probe and is authorized to utilize any resources necessary to complete the investigation. Assistant Chief Keith Porch along with Captain Bret Snavely were the divisions representatives assigned to the Police Review/Community Relations Commission which met on a monthly basis during 2014.

The Mansfield Division of Police handled 25 complaints in 2014, which remain the same as for 2013. Of the 25 complaints, 20 were received from citizens and 5 were internal complaints from within the division.

Of the 20 external complaints investigated, one (1) oral counseling and one (1) suspension were issued. Two (2) of the external complaints were sustained, twelve (12) not sustained and one (1) was exonerated (proper conduct). Of the five (5) internal complaints investigated, two (2) employees received suspensions and two (2) oral counseling. There were five (5) open external complaints and one (1) open internal complaint on an officer.

SPECIAL INVESTIGATIVE SECTION

Reporting to the Chief of Police through Lieutenant Joy Stortz, Special Investigative Unit works a multitude of cases from internal Affairs to complex conspiracy case. Enforcement operations include the METRICH Enforcement Unit and the Crisis Management Team. These consist of the Special Weapons and Tactics Team (SWAT), Disturbance Control Team (DCT), and the Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT).



METRICH

The METRICH Enforcement Unit has now completed its 28th year, and has evolved into a successful law enforcement task force through collaboration and community partnership. The unit, through long and short term investigative strategies, investigates crimes involving drug trafficking, drug abuse, weapons, gang activity, vice related crimes and others. Acting as a fusion center for Richland County, the unit maintains a substantial intelligence database as well as a repository of specialized technical equipment.

In 2014, the METRICH Enforcement Unit in Richland County processed 294 criminal cases. Additionally, the unit conducted 99 search warrants and collected over 2,436 investigative tips and leads. As part of a ten-county multi-jurisdictional task force, MET-RICH is able to share funding, investigative resources, technical equipment, and investigative leads to maximize the taxpayer benefit through our federal, state and local partnerships.

This organizational structure allows task force officers to identify and respond to emerging trends and threats to community safety. For example, in 2011 the substantial increase in synthetic drug use lead to the collaborated efforts to create a local City Ordinance addressing the use and sell of such products. The ordinance was approved by city council, and officers immediately began enforcing the ordinance. The synthetic drug ordnance was effective, and was eventually shared with surrounding jurisdiction, as well as across the state.

METRICH continues to build upon our community and social service partnerships. These partnerships included 7 demand reduction presentations, continued collaboration with Community Action for Capable Youth (CACY), alcohol compliance checks, the parole and probation partnership, neighborhood watch, the Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force (NOVFTF), and the Northern Ohio Violent Crime Consortium (NOVCC).

As we look forward to the challenges of organized criminal activity, particularly in light of a depressed economy, the METRICH Task Force can continue to multiply the taxpayer investment by providing effective and professional police services through community partnership and law enforcement collaboration.

SWAT/ASORT

ASORT had fifteen (15) operators including four new SWAT applicants during 2014. The operators were from three (3) different agencies collaborating their resources and manpower. The agencies providing manpower and resources work collaboratively with SWAT/ASORT on all call outs. One (1) operator was on extended Leave of Absence for the military and should be back to duty in the spring of 2015.







During the year of 2014, the Allied Special Operations Response Team responded to a total of 19 High Risk calls for service.

- Ten (10) of the operations were High Risk Drug & Weapons related search warrants for the METRICH Enforcement Unit.
- One (1) of the operations was a Barricaded Suspect initiated by patrol.
- One (1) of the operations was a drug and weapons related search warrant for Marion County MARMET Unit.
- One (1) of the operations was an apprehension of a homicide suspect for the Major Crimes Unit.
- One (1) of the operations was a was a drug and weapons related search warrant for the Major Crimes Unit along with Richland County Sheriff's Office.
- One (1) of the operations was a Barricaded Gunman in Wakeman, Ohio.
- One (1) of the operations was a Barricaded Gunman in Williard, Ohio.
- One (1) of the operations was a Barricaded Gunman in Olena, Ohio.
- Two (2) of the operations were Barricaded Subjects in Mansfield, Ohio for Richland County Sheriff's Office.

A.S.O.R.T. training consisted of twenty (20) training days. During those training days, operators worked on Practical Applied Stress Shooting drills, in-depth training on Hostage Rescue tactics, Room Entry, Room Clearing, Hallway and Stairway Clearing, Tactical Scouting, Team Movement and Communications, Sniper Initiated Assaults and Search Warrant Execution. Numerous hours were spent on the range conducting "live-fire" room entries and room clearing, "live-fire" hostage rescue training and decision making skills (Shoot/No Shoot) while under stress. ASORT participated in joint scenario based training with HNT at the Clear Fork/K-9 training facility. SWAT/ASORT marks man trained an additional twelve (12) days adding three dimensional targets to the training.

Assistant Chief Tobie Smith: Appointed February 19, 1989 Retired March 03, 2014

Assistant Chief Tobie Smith began her career with the division October 25, 1985. She served as a Dispatcher and Parking Control Officer until her appointment as a Police Officer on February 19, 1989. She was promoted to Sergeant on April 07, 2000 and to Lieutenant on February 14, 2005. She has been assigned to nearly every area of the division including the Patrol Bureau, DARE/Community Policing, Training, Office of Professional Standards, Recruitment, Hiring and the Detective Bureau. 




